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hiRAEL IS starting the new year with a new Knesset and a new government. Foreign policy will be controlled by the Likud - a post-Begin Likud flanked by growing numbers of ultra-nationalists.

It does not matter whether the coalition is a narrow or broad one. The best that Labour can do, now that it has entered the cabinet, is block the "Who is a Jew" amendment (admittedly an important contribution), and try to save the Histadrut economy.

It cannot initiate peace initiatives. It can slow down but cannot halt the expansion of settlements in the occupied territories (any more than it did in the last four years). Shimon Peres was rendered impotent as foreign minister, and will be more so as regards the Middle East conflict after his relegation to the Treasury.

Begin's first government was a coalition with Moshe Dayan and Ezer Weizman. Result: peace with Egypt. His second government was a coalition with Arik Sharon. Result: the war in Lebanon.

The Likud torch then passed to Yitzhak Shamir. His first government was a coalition with Peres. Result: neither war (thanks to Peres). nor peace (thanks to Shamir). What will happen in his second administration, scheduled to serve for the next four years?

WHAT WILL happen is a series of shocks that will shake the complacency of the new leadership as never before. They will discover, as Begin did during his term of office, that Israel's nationalistic aspirations canhas to be taken of realities on the ground. This point was made re-tures.

The first shock came with Yasser Arafat's tour de force in Geneva and Stockholm. Shamir had frustrated the move to negotiate with King Hussem in January, 1987. Peres warned that if we did not talk to the Jordanians, we should have to talk to the PLO. That is precisely what has happened.

Shamir declares that Arafat has said nothing new. Such a declaration is absurd - so absurd that Shamir probably intends to convey something else (that although the PLO have indeed taken a new stand, they do not mean what they say). Unfortunately, it does not matter what Arafat said.

What matters - and what is certainly new - is that as a result of the Palestinian leader's speeches, the U.S. has recognized the PLO. The rest of the world has shifted from a de facto to a de jure recognition of the PLO, now granted honorary statehood by practically every member-state of the UN.

The Jordanian option has been well and truly buried - by Shamir. He keeps stating that he will make peace with the Arabs. He was foreign minister for two years, and prime minister for another two years, at which time he had a peaceloving foreign minister by his side.
