The people of Israel hopes that every Jew wherever he may be will strive to strengthen his ties with the State, develop his knowledge of the reborn Hebrew language and deepen his roots in the heritage of our forefathers.

I am pleased to note that in the year gone-by we have made continued progress in strengthening our friendly relations with the peoples of the world and in gaining their support for our policy of peace. We greatly esteem the aid we have received from friendly nations and from people of goodwill throughout the world.

The past year has witnessed an improvement in the relations between the great powers. This is a first step. Let us hope that it will be followed by additional steps which will result in a further lessening of tension throughout the world and in our troubled region.

In closing, let me recall the blessed memory of the Second President of renascent Israel, our people's beloved Itzhak Ben-Zvi. His death was a heavy loss to Israel and the entire Jewish people.

I wish you all a year of peace and happiness, a year of increased Jewish unity and fruitful work for our joint endeavour.
